Class Assignment suggestion:

Introduce early pottery forms by referencing both the 4 page time line at the front of the book (Hands in Clay, Third Edition) and the first section ?Shaping the Past?. Provide students with excerpts, handouts and or project images from the book to expose them to various primitive pottery producing cultures and forms.

Next by utilizing the second section of the book ?Shaping the Present? teach an appropriate forming technique. Require students to produce a form inspired by a culture they identified with from part one. Upon completion of the form ask students to explain and discuss the role that these forms played in the respective cultures.

Further, encourage your participants to identify the role such practices may take as we move forward.
