4. Methods of Instruction:

Discussion: Small and large group discussion used to collaborate and debate methods of implementation.

Field Trips: Field trips may be used as a means to explore different languages (art mediums).

Lecture: Some lecture is used to present concepts and to lead critique of approaches.

Typical classroom assessment techniques

Quizzes -- Students will take short answer guizzes on readings.

Research Projects -- Students will research 4-5 different philosophies of curriculum development for young children and compare and contrast those to the philosophy used in the Reggio Emilia schools.

Oral Presentation -- Students will create documentation panels on an exploration activity with young children that meets all the requirements for documentation presented and

discussed in class.

Projects -- Students will create in class projects exploring the philosophy of the Reggio Emilia approach.

 - A. Reading Assignments

Reading assignments are based on textbook readings or instructor generated handouts.

For example:

- 1. Read chapter 3 in "The Hundred Languages of Children: The Reggio Emilia Approach-Advanced Reflections" which covers the history, philosophy, and perspectives of the approach used in the Reggio Emilia schools.
- 2. Read chapter 3 in "In the Spirit of the Studio: Learning from the Atelier of Reggio Emilia" which provides an overview of setting up the environment and materials for an exploration.
- B. Writing Assignments
 - 1. Reflective summaries

For example:

Students will watch the movie "Portrait of a Lion" and write a reflection on the process used, the children's exploration, and the children's final creations presented in the movie.

For example:

Working in small groups the students will present their individual documentation panels and mutually critique the panels utilizing the criterion presented in class.
