1. Student Learning Outcomes:

2. Course Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- F. Assist in any backstage and technical needs for the concert;

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3. Course Content

- A. Plan and organize production:
 - a. Set deadlines for promotional release, concert times, technical rehearsal times, first showing and run time.
 - b. Organize into collaborative crews for various tasks such as: stage technical management, sound and light management, house management, ticket sales, program, posters and other promotional documents.
 - c. Create technical/logistical needs lists for specific dances.
- B. Promote:
 - a. Create posters and flyers for press release and campus canvassing.
 - b. Distribute posters and flyers on campus and within the community.
- C. Participate:
 - a. Participate in all agreed timelines and duties.
 - b. Create and / or rehearse all dances.
 - c. Contribute to all stage management needs.

- d. Assist with costuming and make-up needs.

4. Methods of Instruction:

Activity: dancing

Discussion: timelines, production elements and needs, group discussion, show performance order, promotion, backstage technical and organizational needs, theater etiquette, organizing volunteers, creating costumes

Distance Education: Such as: goal setting and weekly personal updates, discussions, technical production needs submissions, rehearsal journal.

Lecture: Production needs and elements, requirements for technical rehearsal, rules, procedures and etiquette while working in a theater.

Typical classroom assessment techniques

Research Projects -- View/study choreographic works of established choreographers. Group Projects -- choreography and production task groups
