- B. Evaluate and critique student music performance and receive personal performance criticism from others.
- 2. Course Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:
 - A. Perform major scales: C, G. F, D, A, E and B, both hands, two octaves, ascending and descending.
 - B. Perform natural, harmonic and melodic minor scales: a, e, d, and g, both hands, two octaves, ascending and descending.
 - C. Perform the primary chords (I-IV-V7) in major keys (C, G, F, D, A, E and B.)
 - D. Perform the primary chords (i-iv-V7) in minor keys (a, d, d, g.)
 - E. Harmonize and perform a diatonic melody using primary and secondary chords.
 - F. Transpose simple melodies and chords into closely related keys.
 - G. Sight read piano pieces using treble and bass clefs including simple and compound meters.
 - H. Play beginning to intermediate level piano repertoire using both hands, executing with accuracy of pitch and rhythm in steady tempo.
