Using nursing threads, concepts and skills previously introduced in Nurs 151 and Nurs 152, this course focuses on the use of nursing process to provide caring for patients, patient centered groups and communities with actual mental illness and those with potential psychosocial alterations. Emphasis is placed on therapeutic communication and group communication. Community care for the person with mental health issues and their families will also be covered.

Major concepts/ topics discussed within this course will include, but is not limited to:

- biological and psychosocial models of mental health / disorders
- legal & ethical issues in mental health: involuntary hospitalization and interdisciplinary teamwork
- continuum of care including partial hospitalization, community, wellness activities
- disease process, diagnosis, and treatment for: Depression

Anxiety disorders

Schizophrenia

Chemical dependence

Acute ETOH withdrawal

Eating disorders

- Mental illness in specific populations: (child, adolescent, older adults) including dementia, delirium, autism
- Acute, chronic mental illness treatment models
- Psychopharmacology and relationships between medical and psychiatric disorders
- Violence (societal, domestic, relation to psychiatric disorders)
